IMPORTANT HEALTH INSURANCE INFORMATION

While enrolled at Robert Morris University, all traditional undergraduate students, both full-time and part-time, are required to carry health insurance.

Additionally, graduate students and adult and continuing education students in the following five categories must submit proof of comparable coverage or buy coverage from RMU's provider:

- International students
- Resident students
- Nursing students
- Intercollegiate NCAA student-athletes
- Club sport athletes

Robert Morris University works with the BCS Health Insurance Plan to provide coverage for all RMU students. If you choose not to purchase insurance coverage from BCS, you must submit proof of comparable coverage from your own insurance provider online. If you have already

entered this information we thank you for your prompt attention to this important matter.

If you have not already provided the university with your insurance information, please visit www.rmu.edu/studentinsurance. Choose the "Student Insurance" option and login to eServices. In eServices, select the "Add" option and complete the online form. This information will be automatically sent to the RMU Student Health Services Office. You can be assured that this information has been received by viewing your student financial account and verifying that the BCS insurance charge of \$940 has been removed.

Proof of comparable medical insurance coverage must be provided by Friday, August 21, 2009 or you will automatically be enrolled in the BCS Health Insurance Plan. A charge of \$940 for the cost of coverage from August 1, 2009 - August 1, 2010 will appear on your student financial account.

A HEALTHY RESOURCE

Student Health Services is RMU's primary health care office, paying special attention to the unique needs of young adults. The staff is committed to the concept of wellness and hopes that students come for useful information, as well as for help when they are ill or injured. We believe that each individual is responsible for his/her health and that traditional medical care is only one part of health care. Self-care is an important way to promote a healthy lifestyle and to detect and prevent illness.

General care will be given to all resident students free of charge. Commuter students may be seen by the physician for a fee of \$10 (cash) per visit. Some non-prescription medications are also provided free of charge. Prescriptions provided by the physician may be filled by the following local pharmacies: Big K Mart, Med-Fast, Giant Eagle, Rite-Aid, and Walgreens. The student should know which pharmacies their insurance provider will honor; if you are unsure call the member services number on the back of the



insurance card. Payment for medications prescribed by the university physician will be the student's responsibility. The Health Services staff will aid students in obtaining appointments with physicians and dentists in the community when specialized care is needed. Any fees incurred for these services will be the responsibility of the student.

Student Health Services is located on the second floor of the Nicholson Center.

The physician is available for care one hour each day, Monday through Friday from the start of the fall term until the end of the academic year.

Friday	3:45–4:30 p.m.

No appointments are necessary. Commuter students are seen by the physician for a fee of \$10 (cash only please).

Student Health Services is also available by calling **412-397-3233** or e-mailing **StudentHealthSvcs@rmu.edu**. Registered nurses are available to respond to your questions. If you need a quick answer to a non-emergency problem or concern, you can just send the nursing staff a message by using the screen name "RMUNurse" during the regular hours of operation.

RMU ALERT

NEW EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

At RMU, we rely on a number of ways to communicate to the campus community in emergency situations, including e-mail, voice mail, media and the Web. We understand however, that we must be able to alert students and employees instantaneously at critical times. With that in mind, the university has launched **RMU ALERT**, an emergency notification system that leverages new technology to reach people more rapidly.

HOW IT WORKS

RMU ALERT allows campus leaders to simultaneously send text, e-mail and voice messages from anywhere, in a matter of minutes, to thousands of cell phones, landline phones, PDAs, pagers, and e-mail accounts. The system will be used only in emergencies, such as power outages, weather-related closings and delays, and campus security situations.

WHAT SHOULD YOUR STUDENT DO?

Students may choose up to six points of contact through a secure online form. Their RMU e-mail address has already been entered into the system. Students may use the additional options for personal or parent/family contact information. Here's what your student should do:

- Go to www.rmu.edu/rmualert.
- Sign into Sentry Secured Services.
- Enter text messaging addresses, e-mail addresses, and phone numbers in the available fields.
- Check the Send "Word Now" agreement box and the electronic signature box.
- Click "Submit."

CAREER CENTER YEAR-IN-REVIEW | 2008–09

- 44 students enrolled in the Career Exploration & Decision-Making course
- 75 students completed practice interviews with employers as part of the Practice Interview Program
- 127 employers attended Career Expo 2008
- 127 different companies and organizations sent representatives to speak to students at career related programs, networking events and classes
- 268 students participated in the Academic Internship Program
- 510 students were employed through the Student Employment Program
- 998 additional students and alumni registered with ColonialTRAK, the office's online registration and job posting system

Through the partnership of these two industry leaders, ColonialTRAK offers students and alumni the ability to:

CAREER EXPO 2009

On Thursday, October 1, the Career Center will host the 13th annual Career Expo from 12:30 – 4:30 p.m. The event typically attracts over 150 employers and over 800 students and alumni. It is one of the largest career fairs in the area and is open only to Robert Morris University students and alumni.

The Career Expo provides an excellent opportunity to connect with potential employers in a wide range of career fields including accounting, communications, engineering, finance, health care, hospitality, social services, technology, and more. Employer participants may be seeking candidates for internships, part-time jobs, or full-time positions. Students and alumni should take advantage of this time to jumpstart their job search and expand their professional networking.

FLU SHOT INFORMATION

Flu shots will be offered by Maxim Health on November 4, in the Jefferson Center T.V. lounge, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. for a fee of \$ 30 (cash preferred). No appointment is necessary.

Anyone with long-term health problems such as heart disease, kidney disease, lung disease, asthma, metabolic disease that diabetes, anemia and other blood disorders, a weakened immune system, or nerve disorder (such as seizure disorders—can lead to breathing or swallowing

problems) should receive the vaccine. Student nurses who provide patient care should receive the vaccine.

Individuals with a moderate to severe illness, severe egg allergy, or history of Guillain- Barre' Syndrome should not receive the immunization.

ENGAGING STUDENTS TO ENGAGE THE WORLD

The Office of Student Civic Engagement (OSCE) has enjoyed two very busy and successful years since it was created in 2007, to support RMU's core values of academic excellence, professional focus, engaged learning, global perspective, individuals matter, and changing lives. The OSCE coordinates three major initiatives: America's Promise, American Humanics, and Community Service, each one of which anticipates an exciting fall. In addition, the OSCE plays an increasing role in assisting faculty to incorporate service-learning into their courses. There will be no shortage of opportunities for your student to get involved. Below is just a sampling of this fall's happenings.

America's Promise: For the past 10 years, RMU has been affiliated with this national nonprofit organization founded by General Colin Powell. America's Promise advocates for and facilitates the delivery of the Five Promises (caring adults, safe places, a healthy start, effective education, service opportunities) to youth 0 – 21 years, with a focus on those most at risk. This fall students will have the opportunity to volunteer as mentors through expanded partnerships with Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Bradley Center and Girls Hope, while it is anticipated that our mentoring program with the Mooncrest Afterschool Program will max out as it does each year. In addition, RMU will be partnering with the City of Pittsburgh, the Pittsburgh Public Schools, and other stakeholders to host a dropout prevention summit, helping to develop an action plan to boost graduation rates in the city schools.

American Humanics: This new and exciting program, which prepares students for professional careers in the nonprofit sector, looks forward to another year of exceptional growth! Launched just

last fall, enrollment quickly grew from an initial four to 19 students who are pursuing this nationally granted professional certification. Students take a series of required classes, fulfill a 300-hour service experience (internship) at a nonprofit agency of their choosing, actively participate in the American Humanics Student Association, and attend one American Humanics Management Institute (national conference). This summer, American Humanics students are interning with Glade Run Lutheran Services, Robert Morris University's Bayer Center for Nonprofit Management, United Way of Mercer County, YMCA of Sewickley, and YWCA of Greater Pittsburgh. Three out of the six student interns secured \$4,500 stipends through a national competition. Recruiting for American Humanics will be ongoing throughout the fall term, so encourage your student to check it out.

Community Service: At RMU, engaging in volunteer service is becoming increasingly "cool!" Students quickly learn that giving back to the community is a centerpiece of the RMU experience and a great way to make friends. One-time or short-term projects such as collecting canned goods for the food bank, donating blood, or raising funds for medical research are available to students, as well as more in-depth involvement opportunities such as Alternative Spring Break trips, becoming a Peer Leader, or serving on our Advisory Council, helping to guide all of our initiatives. There is no shortage of opportunities for your student to get involved and develop his or her leadership potential.

CENTER FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

The Counselors in the Center for Student Success are very eager to get to know the students in the First-Year Seminar class because if we know the student, we can assist him/her better. In an effort to get to know each student, the College Student Inventory (CSI) assessment is administered during the first week of the class. This instrument allows the counselors to not only get an idea of how to better assist each student, but also to meet him/her face-to-face when the student comes in for the inventory results. This instrument is vital to making that first connection with a large portion of the incoming class. However, by no means does a student have to wait for the results

to come in before meeting with his/her counselor. "The earlier, the better" is our motto.

Once the student and counselor have reviewed the CSI, recommendations are made to help the student achieve success while at RMU. The largest recommendation made by the counselors is to take advantage of the free tutoring services that are offered to the students. Tutoring begins the second week of the term and is offered until the last week of scheduled classes. The hours vary depending upon subject; however, the Tutoring Center is open Mon.–Thurs. from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tutoring



is available by appointment on weekends. To request more information regarding the tutoring program, students can stop into the Center for Student Success, e-mail rmututor@rmu.edu, or call 412-397-2220.

Requesting Accommodations in the Classroom and Beyond
